

Celebrating the 30th Anniversary of the Salem-Ota Sister City Relationship

The Salem-Ota sister city relationship story began in 1877 when amateur zoologist and archaeologist, Edward Sylvester Morse discovered the *Ōmori* shell mound in what is now Ota-ku, Tokyo. The excavation opened the

study of archaeology and anthropology in Japan and shed much light on the material culture of prehistoric Japan. Some of Morse's collection has been kept at the Peabody Essex Museum in Salem, MA.

Salem and Ota-ku has been deepening their relationship since signing their sister city agreement in 1991. The following videos commemorate 30 years of exchange between the two cities.

An anniversary celebration of the sister city relationship will be held on July 30th from 1 P.M. - 3 P.M. at the Peabody Essex Museum.

This postcard was sent back to Boston from Japan in 1914. The back says:

"View of Mississippi Bay. These hand colored postals are very cheap in Japan, costing from 1-3 cents each."

Mississippi Bay was the name given by Commodore Matthew Perry to the inlet in Yokohama known as Negishi, where the Black Ships Squadron, among them Perry's flagship the U.S.S. Mississippi, once dropped anchor.

In the distance, one can see the promontory that is now occupied by Yokohama's Naka Ward.
