

What is the connection between Fairhaven, MA and Japan? Fairhaven, MA is the location of the home of Captain William Whitfield where Manjiro Nakahama became the first Japanese person to live in the USA in 1843 having been rescued by the whaler, John Howland, from New Bedford in 1841. In 1987 a group of officials from New Bedford and Fairhaven travelled to



Tosashimizu, Kochi Ken, (Manjiro's home town) and signed a "Sister City" agreement. Since that time, our organization has carried on that relationship with alternating "Manjiro Festivals" in Fairhaven and Tosashimizu. Our latest festival was on October 7th this year. We hosted 24 visitors from Tosashimizu for the weekend and all shared a joyous exchange.

### What does your organization do?

Our organization operates the Whitfield-Manjiro Museum at 11 Cherry Street, Fairhaven. We have had over 11,000 visitors from all continents except Antarctica (We are waiting for polar bear). We also schedule and conduct tours of the Manjiro Trail, eight locations pertinent to Manjiro's life here. Of course we keep an on-going relationship to Tosashimizu. We are also in the process of rehabbing the old horse stable to a cultural center with great assistance from four

classes of the New Bedford Vocational High School.

## John E. Thayer III Award 2023 Recipient

**Akemi Chayama** is the Educator, Japan Program Manager, and a member of the Arts & Culture Team and the Programs & Exhibits Department at **Boston Children's Museum.** 

Akemi was chosen for her work as the curator to the Japanese House exhibit (also known as **Kyo-no-Machiya**), an authentic 1800's house from Kyoto, Japan, which was gifted to the City of Boston on the 20th anniversary of their Sister Cities' Relationship and installed in the Boston



Children's Museum in 1979. Akemi manages the Museum's Japan Program, and strives to develop programs inviting the Museum's young learners and their adults to experience Japan in a multifaceted way, through training in the Anti-bias/Anti-racism education framework.

Born and raised in Hiroshima, Japan, Akemi grew up in an environment where research and

discussions to study peace was part of the school learning curriculum from a young age. While pursuing the medical nurse profession in Japan as a young adult, Akemi's interest in creating a space of intercultural relationships grew more, which eventually led Akemi to study English (ESL) and Visual Arts in the United States. Akemi mostly developed the knowledge and skills of Museum Studies, Historic House Preservation/Curation, and most importantly about Kyoto through the hands-on experience of working at the Museum and various professional development opportunities and mentors, which Akemi is forever grateful for.

Akemi uses both "she" and "they" pronouns, loves the autumn foliage of New England and the winter snow scene of Boston, and believes in and practices the Power of Play - learning through play every day.





Born in Hawaii to parents of Okinawan ancestry, Toshiko Takaezu (1922–2011) was a technically masterful and innovative artist best known for her ceramic sculptures,

which she treated as abstract paintings in the round. The MFA holds a significant collection of Takaezu's pottery—more than 20 examples are featured here alongside loans from private collections.

Challenging traditional presentations of American abstraction, "Toshiko Takaezu: Shaping Abstraction" celebrates the extraordinary range of Takaezu's work—aiming to make her contributions more widely known. It is organized in partnership with the Noguchi Museum and the Toshiko Takaezu Foundation.
