The logic and illogic of Zen chant and thought

Join Professor Steven Nuss of Colby College on a journey through the musical and meditative practices of Rinzai Zen Buddhism. After an introduction to some basics of Zen meditation practice with its heavy emphasis on sutra chanting and its often nonlinear approaches to language, Professor Nuss will encourage us to discuss and think through the logic/anti-logic of Zen's complicated uses of music and language.

The session will end with a session of seated meditation and chanting led by Professor Nuss and student practitioners from Colby College. Participants will have the chance to practice the discipline of Zen chanting and meditation as a group. All this chanting and discussion will help us formulate creative answers to a deceptively simple nest of questions – How do we use spoken language? What happens when music meets language? Why do many religious traditions insist that their texts be sung? What is lost? What is gained?







Every month the Japan Society of Boston reaches into our archives to pull out a postcard that was sent back to us in the early years of our organization. This one was mailed to JSB in 1914 and depicts a rebuilt Daibutsu.

The back of the postcard says:

"Daibutsu' - a gigantic wooden bust of Buddha built recently to replace one of bronze destroyed by fire and earthquake. It's covered with gold leaf."
