How long have you been working in Boston? Since last September, I've been fully immersed in establishing a new lab in Boston for <u>Rigaku</u> <u>Corporation</u>. We aim to showcase to Boston our groundbreaking technology which allows scientists to delve into the molecular image and characteristics of viruses, antibodies, and nucleic acids in solutions named Electron Density Topography or <u>EDT</u>. It's a challenging yet exciting journey which you can read more about in this article by Nature Portfolio: <u>"For protein imaging, the answer is in solution"</u>.

My first visit to Boston was in July 1995, the first place I landed in the US. At that time, little



information was available online, and there was no such thing as Uber. I still remember

mistakenly taking a Black Cab from Logan Airport. I misunderstood that it was a shared taxi worldwide (except the yellow Ford in NY that I saw on TV) since I had just experienced black cabs in London on my first overseas visit as a university professor. Also, my English at the time was no match for my driver's heavy Boston accent, which I hear little of these days.

#### What are the benefits and challenges of working in the US?

Our technology, which provides rapid imaging of therapeutic molecules under flexible conditions in solution, is best demonstrated in Boston/Cambridge. Freezing samples for shipping devalues the unique merits of the technology so we are now settling at SmartLabs at 21 Erie St., within walking distance of many innovative pharmaceutical labs...





### Tomoo Hamada: One Generation to Next An Evening with Japanese Mashiko Potter Artist Tomoo Hamada Thursday, May 15th, 2025 - 6:00 PM EDT Boston Children's Museum 308 Congress St, Boston, MA 02210

The Japan Society of Boston, in collaboration with <u>Boston Children's Museum</u>, is pleased to present an evening with Japanese Mashiko Potter artist, Tomoo Hamada.

Registrants will be able to hear firsthand from the visiting ceramic artist, Tomoo Hamada, who specializes in Mashiko ware (Mashiko-yaki, a type of Japanese pottery traditionally made in the town of Mashiko, located in Tochigi prefecture, Japan). Learn about his art, his family kiln, his community, and his view on the history, philosophy, and concept of Japanese Mingei - people's folk art.

After the presentation, Hamada will briefly demonstrate some of his working techniques with clay. And to close the program, registrants will be able to speak directly with the artist during the Q&A session.

Tomoo's grandfather is Shoji Hamada (1894-1978), a major figure in Japan's Mingei folk art movement in the 1920s, and a recipient of the Living National Treasure recognition in 1955. Tomoo's father, Shinsaku Hamada, (1929-2023), was a respected devotee of Mashiko artisanship who exhibited his works nationally and internationally, a quiet craft maker who truly embraced his studio art process.

Event is free, but registration is required. This event is for adults, ages 16 and up.




### JSB Film Club Wednesday, May 28th, 2025 - 6:00 PM EDT Online






### UNIQLO Festival of Films from Japan May 22nd - June 6th, 2025 Museum of Fine Arts Boston


**ONE OK ROCK** DETOX North American Tour 2025

### Arts of Japan Starting May 11, 2024 <u>Museum of Fine Arts Boston</u>

The MFA has one of the most comprehensive collections of Japanese art anywhere in the world. Reimagined galleries explore Japan's art and visual culture from the 7th century to today, including painting, sculpture, decorative arts, and selections from the Museum's vast collection of ukiyo-e prints. Evocative spaces include the renovated Japanese Buddhist Temple Room, which opened in 1909, and an adaptation of a traditional tea room, with tatami mats and an alcove. Multimedia displays illuminate performative art forms, such as Nō theater, bringing drama to life.

The new space for the Museum's unparalleled Japanese collection—which was the first of its kind in America when established in 1890, and now holds about 100,000 objects—will change regularly, giving visitors the opportunity to see even more works in a setting that honors and celebrates Japan's rich history and cultural legacy.
