Kaidan Kimodameshi: Chilling Tales from Japan July 1-29, 2025 Coolidge Corner Theatre

Summer is a time for scares in Japan. As a way of chilling their bones in the heat, people challenge themselves to watch *kaidan*, or ghost stories. The Japanese word for this is *kimodameshi*.

Some say the reason for this tradition is the fact that Obon, the festival of the dead, falls in August. Other scholars attribute the phenomenon to Edo-period Kabuki theaters performing ghost stories outdoors in the summer to help audiences keep cool. Whatever the origin may be, we thought we'd contribute to this terrifying means of climate control!

In partnership with the Japan Society of Boston, the Coolidge Corner Theatre has programmed five films spanning 50 years of supernatural storytelling from Japanese filmmakers. From Kenji Mizoguchi's masterful *Ugetsu* (1953), to the folk-horror fantasia *Demon Pond* (1979), through 2004's hair-raising Hollywood horror *The Grudge*, and more, "Kaidan Kimodameshi: Chilling Tales from Japan" will certainly send a tingle down your spine this summer!

Summer 2025 is the return of Japanese Prints at Highfield Hall & Gardens on Cape Cod. The College Women's Association of Japan (CWAJ)'s prestigious juried exhibit of contemporary printmaking will be on view from June 21, 2025 through October 26, 2025.

TRAILBLAZERS will feature 137 acclaimed Japanese printmakers, showcasing a range of printmaking techniques from traditional woodblock and intaglio to lithography, etching, aquatint, silkscreen, and contemporary digital innovations. The exhibition highlights five groundbreaking women artists whose contributions have shaped the evolution of contemporary Japanese printmaking: Toko Shinoda (1913-2021), Chizuko Yoshida (1924-2017), Reika Iwami (1927-2020), Noriko Yanagisawa (1940-), and Toeko Tatsuno (1950-2014).

In conjunction with the exhibition, Highfield Hall & Gardens will offer a variety of Japanese cultural programs for children and adults, including gardening, printmaking, origami, cooking classes, lectures, and musical performances. 

Kyudo Bow Making Demonstration with Shibata Kanjuro XXI Sensei Friday, June 20th, 2025 - 5:00 PM EDT

Shibata Kanjuro XXI Sensei is coming from Kyoto to teach in Boston and will demonstrate the art of Yumi (bow) making to JSB members and their plus-ones!

Shibata Sensei is Yumi Maker (Onyumishi) to the Japanese Imperial Household and

master archer of The Heki-Ryu Bishu Chikurin-Ha School of Kyudo (Japanese traditional archery).

JSB participants will join local students of Kyudo from the Boston area, members of Byakko Kyudojo (White Tiger practice group), in observing how a Yumi, more than six feet long when finished, is assembled from seasoned, selected bamboo and other wood. We will be able to see the glueing, roping, and shaping with bamboo wedges, that form the curves of the finished bow.

Byakko Kyudojo was established by Shibata Kanjuro XX, Sendai, in 1981 when he was invited to teach in the United States. It is one of several across the country and in Europe.



Chiharu Shiota: *Home Less Home* Exhibition June 1 - September 1, 2025 ICA Watershed Gallery 256 Marginal St, Boston, MA 02128 In her awe-inspiring installations, Chiharu Shiota (born 1972 in Osaka, Japan; lives and works in Berlin) foregrounds stories of migration, home, connection, memory, and consciousness. Using line in the form of string, Shiota creates immersive installations that underscore human connection and experience.

For the ICA Watershed, Shiota will present two signature, large-scale installations that consider the ways humans collect memories and form connections as they move and travel: a site-specific iteration of *Accumulation – Searching for the Destination* (2014/2025) and a newly commissioned installation, *Home Less Home* (2025).

Featured as part of the Boston Public Art Triennial 2025, this exhibition is Chiharu Shiota's first solo presentation in New England.

Join Murose Kazumi, a master of urushi lacquerware and designated a Living National Treasure of Japan, as he delves into the ancient relationship between the Japanese people and urushi lacquer dating back to the early Jōmon period. Reflect on how lacquer techniques, influenced by the Asian continent after the 8th century, have been passed down and continuously refined—particularly the celebrated *maki-e* technique

perfected during the Heian period. Drawing from his own renowned expertise, Murose emphasizes the unique qualities of Japanese lacquerware and its enduring cultural significance as one of the world's most exceptional artistic traditions.

Kintsugi and Mizuhiki Bookmark Workshops Various June Dates

Ko□Kyoto, one of JSB's <u>member discount providers</u>, has four workshops coming up at the end of June: two beginner Kintsugi and two Mizuhiki Bookmark Making.

Kintsugi is a traditional Japanese method of repairing ceramics by highlighting the lines of breakage with precious metals. It embraces the philosophy of wabi-sabi, highlighting "imperfections" with metal powders and transforming broken pieces into unique works of art. You can bring your own broken pottery or Ko□Kyoto can provide one for you.

Or learn how to make a Mizuhiki bookmark. Mizuhiki is a traditional Japanese art form that involves the use of decorative cords made of brightly colored paper or silk. These cords are often used as embellishments for gifts and ceremonial occasions, as the intricate designs and knots of Mizuhiki carry symbolic meanings.

Japanese Tea Ceremony and Sano Gofu Exhibit June 29, July 27, and September 28, 2025 at 2:00pm Art Complex Museum

The Art Complex Museum invites you to their *Sho-fu-an* or "Wind in the Pines" tea house for a Japanese Tea Ceremony.

Traditionally, the ceremony is practiced in a specialized space called a tea house, designed specifically for tea ceremony gatherings. *Sho-fu-an* was designed by Japanese artist, Sano Gofu. It was built in Kyoto, Japan in 1969 and reassembled at the museum in 1975 under the direction of Yasahiro Iguchi of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. This year marks the 50th anniversary of *Sho-fu-an*.

To celebrate the anniversary, the museum is displaying the show, "Celebrating Sano Gofu" through August 31, 2025. This exhibit features artworks by Gofu from the museum's collection, including original sketches of the design for *Sho-fu-an*.

The tea event is free and all are welcome. Visitors will observe the tea ceremony, receive tea and a special "sweet," and have the opportunity to ask questions of our presenters, who are from Chado Urasenke Tankokai Boston Association.

The annual Maine Japanese Woodworking Festival brings together the best of the Japanese woodworking community where beginners to seasoned woodworkers can share their experience, learn from tool and technique demonstrations and workshops, and compete in a contest to pull the thinnest shaving with a Japanese hand plane.

FLOATING CLOUDS. THE CINEMA OF MIKIO NARUSE

Lesser known to US audiences than Japanese contemporaries Ozu and Mizoguchi, with whom he is often compared, Naruse Mikio (1905-1969) was an equally prolific, subtle and consummate, yet increasingly restrained stylist whose eighty-nine films—of which sixty-nine survive— spanned from the silent era through the 1960s. Although Naruse worked skillfully across genres in the 1930s, during the post-WW2 period he began to almost exclusively direct work in the broad categories of the "women's film" and "shomin-geki," films focused on the daily dramas of contemporary lower-middle-class life, with a frequent emphasis upon directly challenging gender inequality.

Co-presented by The Japan Foundation, the Harvard Film Archive joins venues across the continent in paying tribute to one of Japan's overlooked masters. The HFA's series will be the most extensive of the North American retrospectives, featuring forty-five film prints (all but one on 35mm) from the Japan Foundation and National Film Archive of Japan.

Arts of Japan Starting May 11, 2024 Museum of Fine Arts Boston

The MFA has one of the most comprehensive collections of Japanese art anywhere in the world. Reimagined galleries explore Japan's art and visual culture from the 7th century to today, including painting, sculpture, decorative arts, and selections from the Museum's vast collection of ukiyo-e prints. Evocative spaces include the renovated Japanese Buddhist Temple Room, which opened in 1909, and an adaptation of a traditional tea room, with tatami mats and an alcove. Multimedia displays illuminate performative art forms, such as Nō theater, bringing drama to life.

The new space for the Museum's unparalleled Japanese collection—which was the first of its kind in America when established in 1890, and now holds about 100,000

objects—will change regularly, giving visitors the opportunity to see even more works in a setting that honors and celebrates Japan's rich history and cultural legacy.
