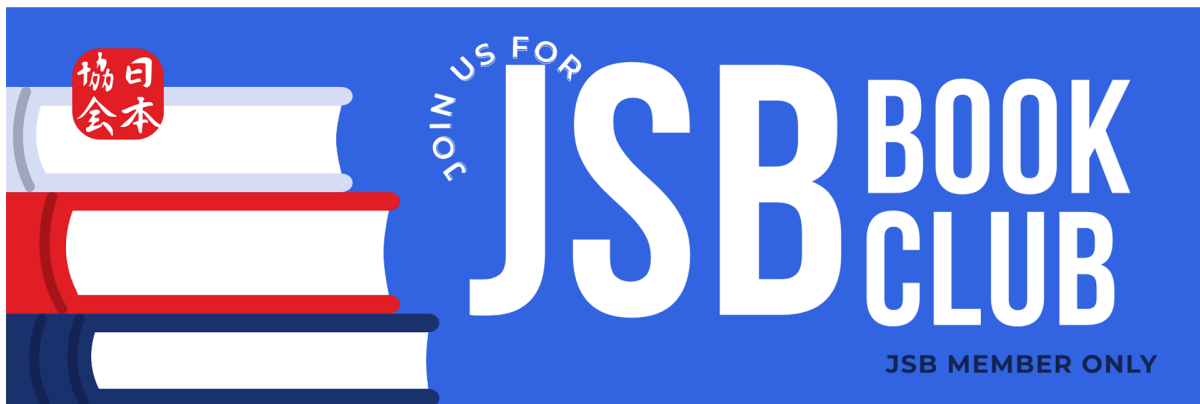

Choreographer and multidisciplinary artist Hiroaki Umeda has been a leading figure in Japan's avant-garde arts scene over the last two decades. His subtle yet visceral dance theater works have toured worldwide to audience and critical acclaim. Dancing within a gorgeous digital stage environment, Umeda choreographs optical, tonal, sensorial, and spatiotemporal elements.

UMass Amherst is the first of just five stops on Umeda's 2026 U.S. tour. His program includes two brand new works, *Moving State 1*, which will be performed by dancers from Umeda's Somatic Field Project; and *assimilating*, Umeda's solo performance. Both pieces explore behavioral design and the "attitudes" of things in motion within a dance aesthetic where refined physicality merges with cyberart.
