

We are honored to present a very special opportunity to observe a master wagashi maker right in Boston as part of our celebrations of the 65th anniversary of the Kyoto-Boston Sister City partnership! Wagashi is a type of traditional Japanese confection that is often served with tea, and made from plant-based ingredients such as mochi, *anko*, and fruit.

Shoji Yamaguchi is coming from Kyoto, Japan to demonstrate live wagashi methods and represent the famous wagashi store, <u>Suetomi</u>, which has been well known for their dedication to heartfelt, non-mass-produced sweets in Japan for over 130 years. Participants will be able to ask him questions and will be served tea and samples of small wagashi made by Yamagushi-san.

The Japan Society of Boston is co-presenting a screening of the Taiwanese-Japanese romance film "18×2 Beyond Youthful Days" followed by a talk with the director, Michihito Fujii, moderated by Professor Jennifer Cullen.

In "18×2 Beyond Youthful Days," a lovelorn Taiwanese man embarks on a soulsearching odyssey across Japan, starring Kuang-Han Hsu (Greg Hsu) ("Marry My Dead Body," 2022) and Kaya Kiyohara ("In the Wake," 2021), this poignant and romantic journey captures the essence of youthful passion and longing, weaving a story that resonates deeply with the heart.

Born in 1986, director Michihito Fujii is a graduate of the Cinema Department at Nihon University's College of Art. Michihito made his directorial debut with OH! FATHER (2014), which is based on Kotaro Isaka's novel of the same name. His 2019 film, The Journalist, was nominated for six Japan Academy Prize categories, three of which it won, in addition to numerous other film awards.




This month's JET Alum is <u>Mary</u> <u>Eberhardinger</u> (Hyogo 2008-2010).

The latest from Ryusuke Hamaguchi (director of 2022's critical darling Drive My Car, winner of the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film in 2023) is a drama that plumbs tensions between the beauty of nature and humankind's destructive urge to commodify that beauty. Deep in the forest of the small rural village Harasawa, single parent Takumi lives with his young daughter, Hana, and takes care of odd jobs for locals, chopping wood and hauling pristine well water. The overpowering serenity of this untouched land of mountains and lakes, where deer peacefully roam free, is about to be disrupted by the imminent arrival of the Tokyo company Playmode, which is ready to start construction on a glamping site for city tourists—a plan, Takumi and his neighbors discover, with dire consequences for the ecological health and cleanliness of their community.

For this extended visit, Hamaguchi Ryusuke will be in person to present and discuss two recent films, *Wheel of Fortune and Fantasy* and *Drive My Car*, as well as a new restoration of a key work by Somai Shinji, a Japanese filmmaker who has exerted a deep influence on Hamaguchi's cinema. The series also includes a live performance by Ishibashi Eiko for whose music Hamaguchi was invited to create a silent film that he would later expand, with sound, into his prizewinning most recent film, the ecological cautionary tale *Evil Does Not Exist*.



ATARASHII GAKKO! (literally meaning "new school" in Japanese) are a group of four young women who are redefining what it means to be a girl group. While most J-Pop female idol groups are known for their squeaky high voices, perfectly synchronized dance moves, feigned images of purity and innocence, and an excessive drive to always be kawaii (cute), AG! isn't into any of that. They wear sailor-fuku (sailor suits) uniforms in a style that were worn by Japanese students back in the 70s and 80s with long skirts and pulled-up socks, and staunchly refuse to be objectified. Their aggressive and expressive dance moves, which they choreograph themselves, are a hybrid of the energy of Japanese butoh dance, heavy metal headbanging, and hip-hop street dancing. Musically, AG! brings together elements of modern J-Pop, Showa-era kayokyoku, rap, punk, dance music, but it would be pointless to try to categorize them in any genre.


